Beginning Machine Quilting by Ann L. Petersen

Suggested book: *Machine Quilting – The Basics and Beyond* by Lynn Witzenburg - \$27.95

1 1/3 yd muslin or other solid fabric (see below)

1/3 yd 90" wide cotton batting such as Hobbs Heirloom or Warm & Natural (or use scraps) NOT polyester

#50 cotton sewing threads in colors that show on the solid fabrics – bring several different types and at least one thread you personally like to use. Colors shouldn't contrast too much (i.e. no black thread on white.)

Sewing machine – clean, in good working order (with your manual), sewing machine extension table (if you have one).

Extra bobbins

Feed-dog cover, if feed dogs don't drop, an index card can work for this, too.

Darning foot or free-motion foot — a must (put foot on machine and a quilt sandwich under the foot and make sure you can move the sandwich with the presser foot down)

Even-feed foot or walking foot — if you have one

#90/14 quilting needles and/or #90/14 topstitch or embroidery needles to fit your machine Scissors, thread snippers

Pencil

If you like quilting gloves such as Machingers by Suzanne Hyland, bring them. I recommend 4" to 5" scraps of rubberized shelf liner or rug backing to help move the quilt.

BEFORE CLASS: Cut from muslin or other solid fabric – four 12" x 22" rectangles, three 11" x 20" rectangles, two pieces 6" x 20". Cut four 22" x 12" pieces of batting. Make three quilt sandwiches using larger fabric rectangles for backing, batting, and smaller fabric rectangles for top. Sew the 6" x 20" pieces together along the 20" sides, press the seam to one side. Make 1 more quilt sandwich using the pieced fabric as the top.

Class Time Goals: Discuss several basting techniques for machine quilting. Practice feed-dogs down free-motion quilting. Learn ways to mark quilts and practice following marked lines. Get ideas for quilting without marking. Practice several background designs.
